Unique Net Neutrality Comments to the FCC in 2017 from IN District #8

These are the 845 unique comments to the FCC in the 2017 net neutrality repeal proceedings from people who identified their addresses as being in Representative Larry Bucshon's district.

This does not include those who submitted comments to the FCC via online form letters.

While tens of millions of Americans did express support for keeping the 2015 rules via online campaigns, form letter responses are NOT included in this document. These are only responses that were hand-written, each of which reflects quite bit of effort and passion. The comments are presented in the order that they were submitted to the FCC.

- 1. Tom Bozikis, Evansville, IN, 47715
 - Obama's Title II order has diminished broadband investment, stifled innovation, and left American consumers potentially on the hook for a new broadband tax. These regulations ended a decades-long bipartisan consensus that the Internet should be regulated through a light touch framework that worked better than anyone could have imagined and made the Internet what it is. For these reasons I urge you to fully repeal the Obama/Wheeler Internet regulations. I am also concerned that with net neutrality that the freedom of expression and "press" could be diminished by regulation. We are all citizen journalists with the right to publish our thoughts in an open and free forum, and a free internet allows this to occur. Also, I would like to see a return to a totally free internet market in which businesses are not required to collected taxes or fees on behalf of any governmental establishment, whether the federal or state authorities.
- 2. Jordan Ledbetter, Evansville, IN, 47715
 - Net neutrality is vitally important to consumers, and this move to neuter it is only evidence of rampant corruption in the FCC. ISPs have already implemented harmful, anti-consumer practices like implementing data caps on other data that do not apply to their own streaming video services, creating an unfair burden on startups in the streaming video market who do not own ISPs. This will be the tip of the iceberg when the common sense net neutrality protections implemented by Commissioner Wheeler are removed. The FTC is

not able to regulate the internet, nor should it be asked to - that is the FCC's job alone. Ajit Pai's attempts to shirk his responsibility as FCC commissioner are a transparent bid for a comfortable job as a lobbyist for an ISP after he leaves the FCC.

And the situation is even more dire for nonprofits like schools, libraries, educational sites, and political groups.

Users of landline telephones never knew the exact locations of every switch, operator, relay and transfer station. They did indeed rely on telephone companies to supply this information â€" as part and parcel of the telecommunications service they asked for.ISPs themselves don't know the location of most of this data. As I mentioned before, much of it is encrypted, or passes through a proxy, or is cached on the fly by Google or Netflix. ISPs follow the instructions of these

services as items are shifted among the global data centers run by Pinterest and Instagram, dutifully transmitting packets from the point specified by the user to another point, either themselves or another service.

MADISON RIVER: In 2005, North Carolina ISP Madison River Communications blocked the voice-over-internet protocol (VOIP) service Vonage. Vonage filed a complaint with the FCC after receiving a slew of customer complaints. The FCC stepped in to sanction Madison River and prevent further blocking, but it lacks the authority to stop this kind of abuse today. COMCAST: In 2005, the nation's largest ISP, Comcast, began secretly blocking peer-to-peer technologies that its customers were using over its network. Users of services like BitTorrent and Gnutella were unable to connect to these services. 2007 investigations from the Associated Press, the Electronic Frontier Foundation and others confirmed that Comcast was indeed blocking or slowing file-sharing applications without disclosing this fact to its customers. TELUS: In 2005, Canada's second-largest telecommunications company, Telus, began blocking access to a server that hosted a website supporting a labor strike against the company. Researchers at Harvard and the University of Toronto found that this action resulted in Telus blocking an additional 766 unrelated sites. AT&T: From 2007â€"2009, AT&T forced Apple to block Skype and other competing VOIP phone services on the iPhone. The wireless provider wanted to prevent iPhone users from using any application that would allow them to make calls on such "over-the-top†voice services. The Google Voice app received similar treatment from carriers like AT&T

when it came on the scene in 2009. WINDSTREAM: In 2010, Windstream Communications, a DSL provider with more than 1 million customers at the time, copped to hijacking user-search queries made using the Google toolbar within Firefox. Users who believed they had set the browser to the search engine of their choice were redirected to Windstream's own search portal and results. MetroPCS: In 2011, MetroPCS, at the time one of the top-five U.S. wireless carriers, announced plans to block streaming video over its 4G network from all sources except YouTube. MetroPCS then threw its weight behind Verizon's court challenge against the FCC's 2010 open internet ruling, hoping that rejection of the agency's authority would allow the company to continue its anti-consumer practices. PAXFIRE: In 2011, the Electronic Frontier Foundation found that several small ISPs were redirecting search queries via the vendor Paxfire. The ISPs identified in the initial Electronic Frontier Foundation report included Cavalier, Cogent, Frontier, Fuse, DirecPC, RCN and Wide Open West. Paxfire would intercept a person's search request at Bing and Yahoo and redirect it to another page. By skipping over the search service's results, the participating ISPs would collect referral fees for delivering users to select websites. AT&T, SPRINT and VERIZON: From 2011â€"2013, AT&T, Sprint and Verizon blocked Google Wallet, a mobilepayment system that competed with a similar service called Isis, which all three companies had a stake in developing. EUROPE: A 2012 report from the Body of European Regulators for Electronic Communications found that violations of Net Neutrality affected at least one in five users in Europe. The report found that blocked or slowed connections to services like VOIP, peer-to-peer technologies, gaming applications and email were commonplace. VERIZON: In 2012, the FCC caught Verizon Wireless blocking people from using tethering applications on their phones. Verizon had asked Google to remove 11 free tethering applications from the Android marketplace. These applications allowed users to circumvent Verizon's \$20 tethering fee and turn their smartphones into Wi-Fi hot spots. By blocking those applications, Verizon violated a Net Neutrality pledge it made to the FCC as a condition of the 2008 airwaves auction. AT&T: In 2012, AT&T announced that it would disable the FaceTime video-calling app on its customers' iPhones unless they subscribed to a more expensive text-and-voice plan. AT&T had one goal in mind: separating customers from more of their money by blocking alternatives to AT&T's own products. VERIZON: During oral arguments in Verizon v. FCC in 2013, judges asked whether the phone giant would favor some preferred services, content or sites over others if the court overruled the agency's existing open internet rules. Verizon counsel Helgi Walker had this to say: "I'm authorized to state from my client today that but for these rules we would be exploring those types of arrangements.†Walker's admission might have gone unnoticed had she not repeated it on at least five separate occasions during arguments. It is a framework to hold internet service providers (ISPs) accountable for their actions. We must not let providers advertise internet speeds that are revoked from the consumer, because a 3rd party has not made an extraneous payment (i.e. bribe). Any language that implies the concept of a "fast lane" by its own inherent nature implies a "slow lane" as well, and the question is who decides whether or not a source of information online is a fast or slow lane? Information has, and always should be, delivered at the speed the content provider has paid to obtain (from THEIR ISP). And in turn, an internet user should have access to the internet at the speed that they have paid to obtain from their ISP. If Netflix pays to have 1Gbit/second upload speeds; and a user pays for 60Mbit/second service, that user should be able to watch shows on Netflix at 60Mbit/second (the slowest link speed between the two). The user's ISP should not be allowed to artificially

slow-down Netflix's speeds, especially for lack of additional payment from Netflix. Why should Netflix have to pay every ISP a bribe to obtain the speed they pay to their provider? Most of the ISPs have a conflict of interest in this regard: AT&T owns DirecTV, so they want to make sure they continue to have a subscriber base for satellite TV; their angle would be to throttle or render alternative entertainment streams as useless by slowing down the Netflixes and Hulus of the online world. Cable companies also have this same conflict of interest -- keeping cable TV subscribers, instead of allowing Internet subscribers to use 3rd parties for pay-for-TV services. Everyone should get the speed they pay their provider for, and the providers need to be held accountable for it.

This analysis builds on the work of several data scientists who analyzed the more than 22 million comments submitted to the FCC in the 2017 proceeding. Jeff Kao used national language processing to group comments into ~60 form letters

submissions and then separated out approximately 800,000 unique comments. He then analyzed the unique comments by pulling out 1,000 at random and found that "It's highly likely that more than 99% of the truly unique comments were in favor of keeping net neutrality."

Kao's work on these comments was covered extensively in the press, including by the Washington Post. https://hackernoon.com/more-than-a-million-pro-repeal-net-neutrality-comments-were-likely-faked-e9f0e3ed36a6.

This analysis used Kao's data set of unique comments (available via the above web page), and then grouped them by House District by their addresses. This was done using a combination of zip code matching and the US Census Bureau's API that matches physical addresses to Congressional Districts. Commenters that submitted unique comments without addresses were excluded from this analysis.
