

Unique Net Neutrality Comments to the FCC in 2017 from NV District #4

These are the 986 unique comments to the FCC in the 2017 net neutrality repeal proceedings from people who identified their addresses as being in Representative Ruben Kihuen's district.

This does not include those who submitted comments to the FCC via online form letters.

While tens of millions of Americans did express support for keeping the 2015 rules via online campaigns, form letter responses are NOT included in this document. These are only responses that were hand-written, each of which reflects quite bit of effort and passion. The comments are presented in the order that they were submitted to the FCC.

Newer companies and small start-ups will be unable to compete when faced with discriminatory services. This would have a severe impact on economic growth and technological innovation and it would negatively impact job growth. The United States would also be less competitive internationally due to a more restricted market, fewer choices, less investment, and as a result fewer innovative technologies. Another issue is the fact that telecommunication companies would be "double-dipping". They offer their customers (your average American) a service for a fee - internet access at a specific speed and up to a specific monthly data cap. That same telecommunication company would then artificially slow down their own customers' internet speed when their users attempt to access specific products - such as Netflix, Google, Amazon, etc unless that company paid a fee - a fee that would "unrestrict" the speed of the internet that the telecommunication customer already paid for. By slowing down their own customer's speed in order to coerce other companies to also pay so said customer has the agreed-upon speed they are double-tipping. Under healthy market conditions, a dissatisfied customer could take their business elsewhere. Unfortunately, many parts of the country are either duopolies or regional monopolies where an alternate choice is non-existent. Simply not having internet access, while possible, would hamper day-to-day life due to how integral internet access has become in the 21st century. For these reasons the internet must remain open and net neutrality preserved. Finally, as revealed by several telecommunication companies to their board of investors (such as Verizon), net neutrality does not and has not adversely impacted business or investment. This is the exact opposite of what telecommunications are telling the public and politicians - that net neutrality is negatively impacting growth and investment in telecommunications.

This analysis builds on the work of several data scientists who analyzed the more than 22 million comments submitted to the FCC in the 2017 proceeding. Jeff Kao used national language processing to group comments into ~60 form letters submissions and then separated out approximately 800,000 unique comments. He then analyzed the unique comments by pulling out 1,000 at random and found that "It's highly likely that more than 99% of the truly unique comments were in favor of keeping net neutrality."

Kao's work on these comments was covered extensively in the press, including by the Washington Post. <https://hackernoon.com/more-than-a-million-pro-repeal-net-neutrality-comments-were-likely-faked-e9f0e3ed36a6>.

This analysis used Kao's data set of unique comments (available via the above web page), and then grouped them by House District by their addresses. This was done using a combination of zip code matching and the US Census Bureau's API that matches physical addresses to Congressional Districts. Commenters that submitted unique comments without addresses were excluded from this analysis.
