

## Unique Net Neutrality Comments to the FCC in 2017 from NY District #16

These are the 1,299 unique comments to the FCC in the 2017 net neutrality repeal proceedings from people who identified their addresses as being in Representative Eliot Engel's district.

This does not include those who submitted comments to the FCC via online form letters.

While tens of millions of Americans did express support for keeping the 2015 rules via online campaigns, form letter responses are NOT included in this document. These are only responses that were hand-written, each of which reflects quite a bit of effort and passion. The comments are presented in the order that they were submitted to the FCC.

I am the Vice President of Technology of a technology-based startup in New York City. I express here my serious concern about the repeal of net neutrality. In short, all internet traffic should be treated identically. It should not be at the discretion of an Internet Service Provider to set and/or adjust rates or throttle content at any level. My specific concerns center around: 1. Repealing net neutrality will stifle competition. America's technology startup sector is the finest in the world. A huge number of innovations and advances come from these companies. However, allowing ISPs to charge different rates for various content delivery will ensure that startups and smaller companies with limited financial resources may be harmed. Essentially, a surcharge or premium could be legally applied to their content versus a larger competitor. 2. ISP availability and switching is limited and difficult. The entire argument behind a free and open market is choice. If net neutrality were not in place, the idea is that a consumer could simply switch to a different ISP that provides a service more in line with their preference. However, the number of ISPs is very limited. My current residence has six available choices, which I would consider to be as robust an offering as one would find in the United States. Previous addresses I've lived at over the past 4 years have had typically only two or three. Secondly, switching ISPs is not a trivial task, as individuals are typically engaged in multi-year contracts. Finally, even if a consumer were to switch to a different ISP, there is no protection that an existing monetary scheme won't change. For example, an individual may change to a new ISP that doesn't add a surcharge to access Netflix, but such a charge may be implemented at any point in the contract. 3. Finally, the internet serves as a public utility. Employers everywhere (including government) rely on email as an official form of communication for business-related items. States, such as New York, require that taxes be paid only online. Government documentation, health plan information, medical records access, and contact information for vital services are primarily (if not exclusively) accessed online. The list is exhaustive. As we progress each year, more and more of our daily lives are dependent upon the internet. Think of the parallel of our postal service. They charge the same amount for a package sent from my healthcare provider as they do a billing statement from any online service I would use (if I were to receive such an item in the mail). The internet is the medium by which we access information. Lawful data should be treated equally. Perhaps a discussion on amount of data transferred, rather than type of data transferred, is the real center of this debate. In fact, most of the arguments presented by ISPs have to do with network strain. If that's the case, cell phone service providers (AT&T and Verizon, for example) already charge based on number of bytes transferred - in this case, this is the model ISPs should focus on. In closing, I fail to see how repealing net neutrality will improve competition or innovation.

This analysis builds on the work of several data scientists who analyzed the more than 22 million comments submitted to the FCC in the 2017 proceeding. Jeff Kao used national language processing to group comments into ~60 form letters submissions and then separated out approximately 800,000 unique comments. He then analyzed the unique comments by pulling out 1,000 at random and found that "It's highly likely that more than 99% of the truly unique comments were in favor of keeping net neutrality."

Kao's work on these comments was covered extensively in the press, including by the Washington Post.

This analysis used Kao's data set of unique comments (available via the above web page), and then grouped them by House District by their addresses. This was done using a combination of zip code matching and the US Census Bureau's API that matches physical addresses to Congressional Districts. Commenters that submitted unique comments without addresses were excluded from this analysis.
