

Unique Net Neutrality Comments to the FCC in 2017 from OH District #8

These are the 1,000 unique comments to the FCC in the 2017 net neutrality repeal proceedings from people who identified their addresses as being in Representative Warren Davidson's district.

This does not include those who submitted comments to the FCC via online form letters.

While tens of millions of Americans did express support for keeping the 2015 rules via online campaigns, form letter responses are NOT included in this document. These are only responses that were hand-written, each of which reflects quite bit of effort and passion. The comments are presented in the order that they were submitted to the FCC.

1. Christopher Guard, Middletown, OH, 45044

Hello. My name is, Christopher Guard. I would like to register my opinion in support of Net Neutrality. I do not support Chairman Pai's recent decision to move toward a non-Net-Neutrality position of the FCC. I feel it is a bad dissension for the American people. I work for a small company in, Franklin, OH. Even though I work with my hands and not with a keyboard, having reliable internet is crucial to our business. We rely on High Speed Internet to contact our customers, research repair projects, and advertise our business. We already struggle getting reliable internet from, Spectrum. Moving away from Net Neutrality will only allow ISPs to further price gouge and ignore maintaining the already insufficient infrastructure.

The no-blocking rule questioned in section 79-81 is vitally important to a free and open internet. If ISPs are allowed to block any website at their own discretion they could easily manipulate information that is allowed to reach their customers which would restrict the freedom of information sharing on the internet. The need for the no-throttling rule and no paid prioritization mentioned in sections 82- 87 is critical to allowing innovators and startups access to consumers without having to go through a pay-to-play scheme set up by ISPs in which corporations or wealthy individuals will have a massive advantage granted to them by virtue of having more money to pay for better connections. Better websites and services without the ability to pay such fees would be

overlooked by consumers in favor of mediocre alternatives solely based on the fact that they are slower, thus creating an anti-competitive environment where innovators are drown out by those able to pay for better access. The transparency rule mentioned in sections 88-90 is imperative to keep competition in the ISP market. In most areas of the US, most consumers are lucky to have more than one major ISP available in their area (which is anti-competitive and ISPs have no incentive to change this), so it is imperative for consumers to know how ISPs are handling their service so they can make the correct choice for them in choosing their provider, especially if the major provider in their area has hidden fees or data caps that the smaller providers in their area do not have. Consumers should always have the right to know what they are purchasing before they cross an invisible line that triggers an extra charge to be added to their account without their knowledge. Net neutrality is vital to both consumers and innovators in the internet age and I believe that all existing rules in place should be left as is. Getting rid of net neutrality will stifle innovation and growth of the US economy by limiting both consumer and creator choice and freedom. The only party that would benefit from the removal of these rules are the ISPs who already have a virtual monopoly on localized markets and price gouge customers because they know they can, and literally everyone else stands to lose a great deal from the next youtube or facebook being snuffed out because they can't reach users as fast as their existing competitors or even at all if the ISP has a disagreement with them. The internet is as vital to our economy as public roads, and limiting access to them would do nothing but hurt our economy.

It has been a catalyst for innovation as the technology that underpins so much of our modern society. I don't think anyone would disagree that it surpasses even telephone lines in terms of societal importance given that you can also make calls over it. Which brings us to the current problem. In a perfect society, federal regulations are far less necessary as free market competition itself causes companies to put their best foot forward. If customers of a service are dissatisfied, they normally have options for competitors to use and this competition and fear of losing customers causes all parties to keep prices and service excellent. However, it's a well known fact that telecom companies by-and-large have monopolies throughout our country with most Americans having little to no choice on who provides their internet service. This problem is made worse by the fact that most of our technological and business growth in the ~15 years has revolved around the internet and these telecoms both control the data lines to American households and have been expanding their businesses beyond being just strictly telecoms. For example, Comcast owns NBC Universal (a large content producer in television and movies) and their Xfinity On-Demand service for home video delivery. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to realize that a few companies with a monopoly on the access lines to American homes that also produce their own content and offer their own media services, is not in American consumers' best interests. Companies with that amount of power can easily squeeze out (or extort) any competition that can't similarly deliver on the full breadth of services from

creation to delivery. In other words, due to the lack of free-market competition, their monopoly ensures they will keep their monopoly and gives them unjust power over possible competition. The language in paragraph 50 is disdainful of consumers caution when such caution is absolutely justified. In footnote 123 of Paragraph 50 it is stated that "because of the very real concerns about the chilling effects that preferential treatment arrangements could have on the virtuous cycle of innovation, consumer demand, and investment, we adopt a bright-line rule banning paid prioritization arrangements." Paid prioritization arrangements, known more colloquially and accurately as extortion rackets, hamper innovation online. How you ask? Fledgling companies would find it hard to prioritize such funds to compete with older more established companies, even if their innovative idea would take off without such arbitrary distinction. This analysis builds on the work of several data scientists who analyzed the more

than 22 million comments submitted to the FCC in the 2017 proceeding. Jeff Kao used natural language processing to group comments into ~60 form letters submissions and then separated out approximately 800,000 unique comments. He then analyzed the unique comments by pulling out 1,000 at random and found that "It's highly likely that more than 99% of the truly unique comments were in favor of keeping net neutrality."

Kao's work on these comments was covered extensively in the press, including by the Washington Post. <https://hackernoon.com/more-than-a-million-pro-repeal-net-neutrality-comments-were-likely-faked-e9f0e3ed36a6>.

This analysis used Kao's data set of unique comments (available via the above web page), and then grouped them by House District by their addresses. This was done using a combination of zip code matching and the US Census Bureau's API that matches physical addresses to Congressional Districts. Commenters that submitted unique comments without addresses were excluded from this analysis.
